

## Educational Ideals

*Foster individuals who can approach global issues with “strength and dignity”.*

### [Vision]

The mission of Kwansai Gakuin is to cultivate world citizens who embody “Mastery for Service” through education based on Christian principles, and to send them out into the world. A “world citizen”<sup>1</sup> is someone who possesses the skills to communicate and empathize with others, then take responsibility for creating a better world.

Kwansai Gakuin has two people who exemplify the “world citizen” ideal. The first is the founding Chancellor, W.R. Lambuth, who traveled the globe and preached Christianity as a missionary through medicine. The other is the first Dean of Kwansai Gakuin University (and Kwansai Gakuin’s 4th Chancellor), C.J.L. Bates, who was the model for “service to the world through business,” which expressed the school motto based on the Protestant spirit. Sending out into the world many graduates who will play an active role in both the public sector, including international contributions, and the business sector, and creating true global leaders who possess “strength and dignity” and who will tackle global issues and lead the world to solutions – this is the Kwansai Gakuin ideal.<sup>2</sup>

In 2039, the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Kwansai Gakuin, factors like the decline in Japan’s birth rate and advances in AI mean that society is expected to look vastly different from how it is today. Even in that future era, it is our hope that our graduates will hold the school motto close to their hearts; we hope that with a firm sense of values and rich humanity, they will use the knowledge and skills they have acquired at Kwansai Gakuin to lead “fulfilling and meaningful lives” by participating actively in a diverse range of fields and serving their neighbors, society and the world. The nine schools of Kwansai Gakuin<sup>3</sup> will make the most of their collective strengths as a comprehensive educational institution with a highly international character, and combine forces to work towards the realization of that ideal.

Also, the motto of the Kwansai Gakuin University sports club association, “noble stubbornness” comes from a poem written by 17th-century English poet, J. Dryden.
